


CITIES C⊕UNTD⊕WN TO 2030



The Cities Countdown to 2030 is a political initiative led by United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG) that brings visibility to transformative infrastructure projects already underway in cities and regions across the world. These projects channel millions in public investment to deliver the urgent transitions demanded by the 2030 Agenda—transforming and improving the lives of millions of people through local action.

The Cities Countdown to 2030 showcases how cities and regions are already powering food systems and creating jobs, connecting people through energy and technology, expanding e-commerce opportunities, and grounding all transitions in the climate and equality agendas. It proves that investments are reaching the local level and how this can be further enabled by closing policy and regulatory gaps, making financing market-ready, mobilizing a mix of domestic, public and private resources, and reinforcing institutions to build solid foundations. This time, the house is being built from the ground up and the Countdown is how we bring 2030 back.

The Cities Countdown to 2030 is designed to:

Provide concrete examples from cities and regions already mobilizing investments toward the implementation of the 2030 Agenda;

Formally contribute to the United Nations' High-Impact Initiative on Localization;

Serve as a platform to showcase local political leadership and best practices, feeding the 2030 Agenda and the multilateral system beyond;

Strengthen collective efforts to position localization as a key driver of global transformation.

Rooted in the values of care for people and the planet set out in the UCLG Pact for the Future of Humanity, the Countdown is also a call for stronger recognition of local and regional leadership in global governance, for renewed and equitable access to financing, and for the structured engagement of cities and regions within the international system.

The Countdown is not a retrospective, it is an active political process. These fact-sheets are just the beginning of a growing body of evidence proving that local and regional governments are not only implementing the SDGs, they are shaping the path forward.

The Countdown has begun.



Located in Central Anatolia, Konya is one of Türkiye's largest agricultural basins. Its strategic position makes it the country's agricultural heartland. With extensive natural resources and a strong farming tradition, the city stands as a national benchmark in sustainable agriculture and food systems innovation.

Konya Model: "How to Feed, Not Deplete the World"

Objective

Build an integrated public food system promoting sustainability, gender equality, education and local economy

KONYA is transforming its agricultural heritage into a globally relevant model for sustainable and public food systems. Led by Konya Metropolitan Municipality, the project integrates food security & waste reduction, innovation, resilience, gender equality, education and economic development, addressing the entire agri-food chain from production to consumption.

Key actions include support for drought-resilient crops, organic farming, modern irrigation and renewable energy. Education programmes target youth, women and farmers. Women are supported to manage sales points at municipal organic markets. Young and small producers benefit from agri-tech access, too.

The municipality operates 45 Fenni Fırın branches, providing safe, affordable bread, and distributes publicly produced local food through its Pelen brand, showing how local authorities can manage food systems as a public service.

Konya also plays a leading international role through AGRICITIES, promoting agricultural diplomacy and knowledge exchange.



City's Attribute

Xianning is a mid-sized city in the mountainous, rainy Hubei Province, with modest economic capacity that drives parents to commute to larger cities, leaving many children in the care of their grandparents. This creates urgent mobility and safety challenges around schools and daily routes.

From child-friendly to all age-friendly urban governance innovation

Objective

To build safer, child-friendly and intergenerational cities through co-creation and cross-sector collaboration

XIANNING has developed a model of urban transformation that begins with the vision of a child-friendly city and is now evolving into resilient, all-age-friendly neighborhoods. The pilot project at Xianning Seventh Elementary School significantly improved child traffic safety through safe school routes, citizen engagement, reuse of public spaces and materials, and cross-departmental coordination. The impact has been remarkable: 95% of students now walk to school and traffic accidents around the school dropped by 98%. This model has since been replicated in 20 schools and 15 cities across the province. In the face of growing urban and climate challenges, Xianning is now expanding this approach to include flood-prone neighborhoods, using nature-based solutions, early-warning technologies, and co-designed home and public space upgrades. This project exemplifies a low-cost, replicable institutional innovation with strong social and environmental impact, creating safer and more inclusive environments for children—and increasingly, for all city residents.



Durable Qaddura

Objective

Improving the livelihoods of refugees and vulnerable groups in Qaddura **Camp**

THE DURABLE QADDURA project is a communitv-led initiative launched by the City of Ramallah in 2023 to improve living conditions in Qaddura, an unrecognized refugee camp home to around 2000 residents, including 700 children. The municipality, supported by the Mayors Migration Council's Global Cities Fund for Refugees, worked directly with residents to address key needs. The project focused on three main interventions: strengthening solid waste management, rehabilitating the camp's neglected public park, and raising environmental awareness through community-led campaigns. Children and caregivers played a central role in shaping and implementing the improvements, from safer play areas to expanded park access. The initiative promoted inclusive, sustainable urban development and localized the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), especially those related to health, environment, and community engagement. It now serves as a model for refugee-responsive city planning.

Barcelona has a long-standing tradition of ambitious climate action and civic engagement. Over the past 25 years, the city has positioned itself as a pioneer in urban sustainability, combining innovative regulations, strategic plans, and participatory frameworks.

Climate Plan, for the people, for Barcelona

Objective

Achieve climate neutrality, strengthen urban resilience and ensure a fair ecological transition by 2030.

As part of the EU Mission '100 CLIMATE-NEUTRAL CITIES', it combines ambitious mitigation and adaptation goals with a strong focus on climate justice, prioritising health protection and the economic opportunities of the transition.

Grounded in a Climate City Contract validated by the European Commission, the plan introduces a participatory governance model involving political leadership, cross-departmental coordination and citizen engagement through the More Sustainable Barcelona network, the so-called collaborative challenges and the climate assembly.

The plan defines 242 actions structured around six strategic areas: 1. Energy Transition (which includes Buildings), 2. Mobility, 3. Resilience (focusing on the risks associated to water), 4. Heat, 5. Let's change for the climate (through science, education and culture) and 6. Neighbourhoods, to make sure that the climate transition action reaches every corner of the city.

Paris is a global capital with compact, walkable neighbourhoods, strong civic engagement and inclusive public infrastructure fostering proximity, urban vitality, social cohesion and environmental resilience.

15-Minute City (Ville du Quart d'Heure)

Objective

To improve quality of life, urban sustainability and resilience by ensuring access to essential services

THE 15-MINUTE CITY is an urban strategy launched by Paris in 2020 to reorganise city life around spatial and functional proximity. It aims to ensure access to six key urban functions—housing, work, food, health, education and leisure—within 15 minutes on foot or by bike. In response to climate, social and mobility challenges, the initiative promotes compact, mixeduse neighbourhoods, reduced car dependency and greener, more inclusive public spaces.

Actions include school streets, open courtyards, expanded cycling lanes, local commerce support and the reuse of public infrastructure.

Beyond a planning tool, the 15-Minute City represents a vision of a polycentric city, where urban density enables critical mass and gives meaning to proximity, social cohesion and a more liveable daily life.

Digital Transformation & Amman Smart City

Objective


Modernise public services using digital tools to boost efficiency. transparency and citizen experience

THE GREATER AMMAN MUNICIPALITY (GAM) is implementing an integrated digital transformation strategy to improve urban mobility, enhance public services and strengthen institutional efficiency. Launched with the Electronic Transformation Project in 2017, the initiative converted over 134 services from manual. paper-based procedures into an efficient digital ecosystem, significantly reducing costs and physical visits to municipal offices. Building on this progress, the Amman Smart City Project was launched in July 2024 to establish a digital platform initially focused on smart mobility. Flagship achievements include Jordan's first contactless transit payment system—operational on BRT and Amman Bus lines—as well as data-driven tools such as real-time traffic monitoring, automated parking and e-charging stations. In parallel, GAM's IT Directorate is deploying secure digital infrastructure to interconnect departments, expand online services and improve citizen engagement. These innovations aim to promote transparency, responsiveness and inclusive, data-informed public governance














Bogotá is a diverse, dense and civic-minded city shaped by geographic constraints. It has a longstanding commitment to sustainable urban mobility and integrated transport planning.

Sustainable and safe urban mobility development policy

Objective

Achieve 77% of daily trips via sustainable transport modes by 2035

BOGOTÁ'S SUSTAINABLE AND SAFE URBAN MOBILITY POLICY (PMSS) is a long-term roadmap guiding mobility planning to 2035. It aims to ensure that 77% of daily trips are made by sustainable modes public transport, walking, and cycling-while reducing emissions by 40%. The policy supports a shift towards inclusive, zero- and low-emission mobility, with projects including two metro lines, Regiotram systems, cable cars, and a 500 km expansion of the cycling network. It also includes intermodal hubs, fare equity reforms, and full electrification of the public fleet by 2039. The policy incorporates gender-sensitive planning, urban logistics, and road safety under Vision Zero. Broad citizen engagement and metropolitan coordination make this a flagship initiative for equitable, climate-aligned urban transformation.



Brazzaville, capital of the Republic of Congo, is a cosmopolitan city mostly youth, facing rapid demographic growth, urban sprawl, frequent flooding, and significant challenges in providing basic services to improve residents' living conditions, and also very rich in art and history, contributing to its vibrant cultural identity.

Implementation of UCLG's Culture 21 Plus in the frame of Culture 2030 Goal campaign

Objective

To promote synergies between culture, environment and innovation for inclusive urban development

SINCE 2012, BRAZZAVILLE has advanced an integrated cultural strategy as a driver of its sustainable urban development. Following the adoption of its first cultural policy, it was designated UNESCO Creative City of Music in 2013. Through cross-sectoral initiatives, the city links creativity, education, heritage and environmental action. Key milestones include the transformation of public spaces into cultural venues, integration of cultural heritage into school curricula, and international mobility programmes for artists and cultural operators. The regeneration of the Poto Poto neighbourhood, centred on the rehabilitation of the Maison Commune. illustrates this integrated approach. Brazzaville's designation as African Capital of Culture 2025-2026 and its role in the UCLG "Seven Keys" workshop affirm its leadership in aligning territorial cultural policies with the SDGs through participatory governance and the Culture 21 Plus framework.



Johannesburg's role as South Africa's economic hub, its diverse population, entrepreneurial spirit, and commitment to inclusive growth, bring about its drive for transparent, efficient, and accountable municipal financial management.

Financial Development Plan for financial sustainability, strengthened fiscal position and expanded investment

Objective

To build a financially sustainable,

transparent, and efficient municipality that ensures equitable service delivery and fiscal accountability.

THE CITY OF JOHANNESBURG adopted a long-term Financial Development Plan (FDP), committing to a 10-year plan aimed at building financial sustainability, strengthening the City's fiscal position, and expanding infrastructure investment.

As Johannesburg continues to attract migrants-receiving over 10,000 people each month—the City proactively developed the FDP to address growing infrastructure needs and improve service delivery.

The City recognised that sustainable infrastructure development cannot rely solely on transfers from the National Government. It must also be supported by leveraging the City's balance sheet and optimising internally generated cash from operations to produce cash-backed surpluses for reinvestment into infrastructure. Revenue enhancement initiatives were implemented alongside efforts to curtail unnecessary operational expenditure.

Furthermore, the City has been an active participant in capital markets, issuing various bonds-including Green Bond—and entering into bilateral loan agreements with banks and Development Finance Institutions (DFIs).

UTOPIAS: Units of Transformation and Organisation for Inclusion and Social Harmony

Objective

Creation of inclusive public spaces to foster social cohesion, civic participation, and key public service delivery

Faced with a shortage of adequate, high-quality public spaces and services, the people of **MEXICO** CITY have long fought to preserve and recover neglected community areas marked by marginalisation, violence, and exclusion. In response, the government of Clara Brugada launched UTOPÍAS-first in Iztapalapa-as a high-impact strategy to reclaim the right to the city by building large-scale urban facilities in the most underserved areas. These inclusive, dignified public spaces aim to reverse deep socio-territorial inequalities and serve as foundations for community life. especially for women and caregivers. UTOPÍAS are guided by principles of social justice, gender equality, democratic participation, sustainability, and respect for diversity and the environment. The challenge now is to scale the project across



Kisumu city as the third-largest city in Kenya serves as a key economic, cultural, and transportation hub in East Africa. Its strategic location and commitment to inclusive governance and sustainable planning provide a solid foundation for integrated urban and public service transformation.

Kisumu Urban Projects (KUP)

Objective

Improve spatial equity and quality of life through better services and infrastructure management

Launched in 2012, the KISUMU URBAN PROJECTS (KUP) initiative was designed as a pilot for the Kenya Municipal Program (KMP). It responds to the city's need for more resilient infrastructure, inclusive service provision, and improved urban management.

The project combines the upgrading of informal settlements with strategic land-use planning, institutional capacity-building, and the renewal of essential public services. It also promotes transparent, citizen-centred governance and innovation in municipal operations.

Key interventions include the rehabilitation of local markets (Otonglo, Jubilee), construction of schools and bio-centers, improvement of local access roads and footbridges, installation of high-mast lighting, establishment of health and social centres, solid waste equipment provision, and the creation of a GIS-based city base map and ICT data centre for an improved urban management.

By addressing physical infrastructure and service gaps while modernising municipal systems, KUP has helped advance Kisumu's vision as a well-managed, inclusive, and forward-looking city.

Montevideo is a compact coastal capital with extensive public services, a strong cooperative housing tradition, and progressive social policies. Its capacity for integrated neighbourhood upgrading enables participatory, coordinated responses to spatial and social inequalities.

Integrated and participatory urban regeneration for deprived areas

Objective

To improve living conditions and promote inclusive, sustainable urban development in vulnerable areas

THE MONTEVIDEO HABITAT PROGRAM, led by the city's Division of Land and Habitat, is a comprehensive urban improvement programme targeting informal settlements and undervalued urban areas. It delivers infrastructure upgrades-paved roads, public lighting, and enhanced public spaces-while reclaiming abandoned properties to dedicate to social and cooperative housing. Rehabilitation of existing homes is supported through micro-loans and subsidies, coordinated with inter-institutional actors for resettlement schemes. Core to its strategy is the coordination of a municipal land portfolio ("cartera de tierras") facilitating access to urban land for housing purposes. The programme also galvanises cooperative housing based on Uruguayan mutual-aid models, integrating technical assistance institutes that support design, financing and participatory construction processes, including residents' contribution of labour and savings (e.g. ≥15% value). Central components-such as Plan Abre-address over 30 vulnerable neighbourhoods and benefit thousands of families with community-driven, institutionally backed spatial interventions. This model combines infrastructure, land governance, financing mechanisms and community participation to reduce urban inequality and foster dignified living environments.



City's Attribute

Guangzhou is a dynamic, innovation-led metropolis committed to climate leadership and public service excellence. Its scale, industrial capacity and strong institutional coordination have enabled the rapid decarbonisation of urban mobility. As a member of UCLG, Metropolis and C40, Guangzhou is fully committed to accelerating the local implementation of the Global **Agendas**

Guangzhou New Energy Public Transport Development Programme

Objective

To deliver a fully electric public transport network while enhancing system efficiency and reducing carbon emissions

Launched in 2017, the GUANGZHOU New Energy Public Transport Development Programme led to full electrification of the city's bus and taxi fleet. By 2023. over 12.000 electric buses and 10.000 taxis operated across the city, supported by 6800 charqing points. The Ruyue platform manages over 180 stations, and two energy parks integrate solar generation, fast charging and second-life battery storage. This transformation cut energy use by over 50% and CO₂ emissions by more than 500.000 tonnes. Retired bus batteries are repurposed for up to four additional years of grid-connected energy storage. A 3 GW facility now supports peak grid demand while charging at night and integrating solar during the day. What began as a zero-emission transport project has become a profitable energy ecosystem, lowering reliance on subsidies and water use, while improving battery-recycling and emissions reduction.

Guadalajara's cultural richness, strong civic identity, and commitment to social equity stimulate inclusive policies that prioritize care, community resilience, gender equality, and the right to the city for all citizens.

Guadalajara cares for you

Objective

To build a caring, inclusive, and resilient Guadalajara through social protection and economic support.

"GUADALAJARA TE CUIDA" (Guadalajara cares for you) is a municipal initiative that places care, equity and citizen well-being at the core of local governance. Structured around three strategic pillars—community-based public safety, high-quality public services and spaces, and integrated social **policies** with a care-economy approach—it addresses the needs of historically marginalised groups, including women, older people, children, and persons with disabilities.

As part of this strategy, the municipality launched 23 targeted programmes, such as Cuidamos tu Empleo, Guadalajara Está Contigo, and Despensa Segura, benefiting approximately 250.000 residents. These measures include neighbourhood policing, accessible urban services, extended paternity leave, gender-awareness workshops, health and scholarship schemes, and support for women-led entrepreneurship.

The initiative also fosters co-responsibility: citizens actively engage through public forums to co-design a safer, more inclusive and sustainable city.



Malmö combines bold climate leadership with a tradition of collaborative governance and sustainable innovation. As Sweden's most diverse and rapidly transforming city, it offers fertile ground for pioneering a just and climate-neutral built environment.

LFM30: Local roadmap for a climate-neutral building, construction and real estate management sector

Objective

Enable a zero-emission built environment by 2030 through partnerships, design and materials

THE LFM30 is a sector-led initiative launched in 2018 to decarbonise Malmö's construction and property management sector by 2030 and reach climate-positivity by 2035. Coordinated jointly by the City of Malmö and a dedicated industry association, the roadmap brings together over 200 stakeholders across the building value chain-including developers, contractors, consultants, financiers, and suppliers. It sets a collective target to reduce emissions by 50% by 2025 and standardises life-cycle climate calculations, climate budgeting and sustainable procurement. The initiative promotes circular economy principles, the use of low-carbon materials and innovation in property operations. Flagship pilots include timber-based, solar-powered infrastructure with stormwater reuse and green façades. Supported by Sweden's innovation agency VINNOVA, LFM30 is integrated in Malmö's local climate governance and contributes to EU and UN decarbonisation goals as a scalable model for transforming the built environment.


